## DAVID SCHRADER ORGAN, HARPSICHORD, FORTEPIANO

Equally at home in front of a harpsichord, organ, piano, or fortepiano, David Schrader is "truly an extraordinary musician . . . (who) brings out not only the unfailing right technical approach to each of these different instruments, but always an imaginative, fascinating musicality to all of (Norman Pelligrini, WFMT, Chicago) A musician of wide ranging interests and accomplishments, Mr. Schrader has been invited to appear as a featured artist at the American Guild of Organists Convention in 1998. This marks his third appearance at an AGO National Convention. having previously appeared as a featured artist with the Dallas Symphony Orchestra in 1994 and the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra in 1984. Mr. Schrader has performed with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Sir Georg Solti, Daniel Barenboim, Claudio Abbado, Erich Leinsdorf, and Myung Whun Chung. Mr. Schrader has also appeared as soloist with many other orchestras throughout the United States and Canada, and he will perform again as a soloist with the Grant Park Symphony Orchestra in August of 1998. Mr. Schrader has appeared at numerous music festivals, most notably those of Aspen, the Michigan Mozartfest, performing with Roger Norrington, and the Connecticut Early Music Festival. He has performed as soloist and conductor at the Woodstock Mozart Festival and as soloist at the Peninsula Music Festival. Mr. Schrader has appeared in recital in the United States, Canada, Mexico, Japan and Europe.

A resident of Chicago, Mr. Schrader leads an active musical life. He is the harpsichordist for The Chicago Baroque Ensemble, whose recording, "A Vivaldi Concert," has been acclaimed "a brilliant debut recording." Performing regularly with Music of the Baroque and the Rembrandt Chamber Players, Mr. Schrader has also appeared with the Chicago Chamber Musicians, The Contemporary Chamber Players, and The City Musick. He is a frequent guest on WFMT radio (Chicago), both on record and in live broadcasts from WFMT's studios.

Mr. Schrader is on the faculty of Roosevelt University for performance and academic studies and is the organist of the Church of the Ascension, whose liturgies command a national reputation for musical integrity.

Mr. Schrader's recordings include concerti of J. S. Bach with the Stuttgart Chamber Orchestra for the Intercord label, and continuo for Sir Georg Solti's *Creation*, *St. Matthew Passion*, and *Messiah* for the London label, as well as many releases of solo repertoire on the Cedille label, including the music of Bach, Soler, Franck and Dupré. His most recent recording, the music of Domenico Scarlatti, will be released in July of 1998. He has also recorded for the Centaur and CRI labels.

David Schrader holds degrees from the University of Colorado, and from Indiana University where he received the coveted Performer's Certificate as well as a Doctor of Music degree. His principal teachers have been Storm Bull, Abbey Simon, Anthony Newman and Everett Jay Hilty. A winner of the Music Teachers' National Association Competition in Organ Playing, Schrader has also been a finalist in the Clarence Mader Competition, the American Guild of Organists' Competition, and the Erwin Bodky Competition. He is listed in Outstanding Young Men of America, International Youth in Achievement and the International Who's Who in Music.

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
